## ***THE CALENDAR & HOLIDAYS***

### **CHESHVAN → KISLEV (NOVEMBER)**

Cheshvan began October 30<sup>th</sup> and runs until November 27<sup>th</sup>. The 28<sup>th</sup> of November is Rosh Chodesh (new month/moon) for Kislev.

Kislev is often called Mar-Kislev (bitter Kislev) because there are no holidays in the month. Of course, having just come off almost a month of holidays, this seems a nice change of pace!

The only holiday in Kislev is Chanukah, which is the 25<sup>th</sup> of Kislev through

the 2<sup>nd</sup> of Tevet. This year the first night of Chanukah is December 21<sup>st</sup>, and the last night is December 28<sup>th</sup>. The eight days of Chanukah fall on the 22<sup>nd</sup> to the 29<sup>th</sup> of December.

## ***TORAH PARASHIOT***

Torah parashiot (Torah portions) read for the period covered by this newsletter include the following in November: Noah, Lech Lecha, Vayera, Chayei Sarah, and Toledot, drawn from Bereshit (Genesis) 6:9-28:9.

Haftarot (selections from the Prophets) read on Shabbatot (Sabbaths) in November include selections from Isaiah 54-55, 40-41, 2 Kings 4, 1 Kings 1, and Malachi 1-2.

## ***SOME ITEMS OF NOTE***

I want to highlight a few things that are recent or will be coming up.

Rabbi Sue and I have each placed our High Holiday sermons on the THOI web site in the blog that is located there. If you wish to see them, simply visit [www.thoi.org](http://www.thoi.org) and click on Blog. You will see the entries for each of our sermons, if you wish, in a written form.

You should find a Jewish calendar available to you in the building, courtesy of Reynolds Hamrick Funeral Home. Please feel free to take one.

There is a Shabbat service weekly at Beth El. When the rabbi is not present, these services are lay-led. Consult the congregational calendar for details, and see the website, Bulletin, and weekly announcements for any changes.

## ***OTHER PROGRAMS & SPECIAL ACTIVITIES***

If you feel a conversation with the rabbi on any topic would be of benefit to you, please be in touch to make an appointment. You can call or email Rabbi Joe.

Please know that we always seek congregant and guest participation in services

throughout the year. If you are interested in taking a role in a service, please be in touch with Rabbi Joe, Margee Greenfield, or Gary Stein. Roles include: reading Torah, reading Haftarah, serving as Gabbai (the “MC” for the Torah service), reading an English reading, leading a lay service, or having an honor. The Honors we usually confer in our services include being called up for an Aliyah (saying the blessings for the Torah or the Haftarah reading), serving as Hagbah (lift, hold, and carry the Torah), Gelilah (undressing and dressing the Torah), or Petichah Usegurah (opening and closing the Ark).

## **RABBINIC EDUCATION INITIATIVES**

Some of the classes/courses have begun!

1. The Introduction to Judaism (ITJ) course is in progress. No additional students will be accepted for this year. The class is full at 16 members. If you are interested in a future course, please contact Rabbi Joe.

2. The Tanakh: Women of the Bible series of classes has met twice. Each class is stand alone, so you don’t have to attend every one of them. I intend to look at the Tanakh text in some detail, and especially at the doings of the women included in various sections, and try to tease out a bit of their stories, as well as look at the historical and contextual world in which those stories are unfolding.

The setting for this class would be akin to a seminar in which we would look at the story of one woman/group of women in each class, and read the text (in English), talk about the background, and discuss the story. It is scheduled on Sunday afternoons, from 2-3:30 or 4 pm. It will be held monthly. Some months we will be at THOI, but the bulk of the classes will meet at Beth El in Harrisonburg. The next class will be on November 23<sup>rd</sup> (A CHANGE) at Beth El in Harrisonburg. Our topic will be Abraham

and Sarah, essentially some or all of Bereshit (Genesis) chapters 12-18.

3. If you have been meaning to learn how to read Hebrew (or improve your reading) in order to better follow services, plan to attend a free six session course. I will offer a beginner’s class to begin on Thursday November the 6<sup>th</sup> at 6 pm at Beth El. This is planned to be a six session course, including mastery of the alefbet and vowels, an initial introduction to some common vocabulary in the liturgy, and some writing practice (new this year) to reinforce what we have covered. This course is similar to what has been offered in past under the titles Introduction to Hebrew, Crash Course in Reading Hebrew, and Read Hebrew America.

4. If you are interested in studying for and celebrating a B’nai Mitzvah, or in learning to leyn (read/chant) Torah and/or Haftarah, or to lead services, or serve as a gabbai (MC for the Torah service), please be in touch with the rabbi. Classes are planned for later this year. More information will be forthcoming soon.

5. Torah Limud – a monthly Torah study session at Beth El that looks at that week’s Torah Parashah and tries to fit it into the context of the larger story. Open for discussion. This will usually take place on Friday evening from 6:30 to 7:30, and you are welcome to bring a meal to eat while we talk. On some occasions, it will be moved to Saturday morning, when we have a Shabbat morning service, and in that case, will follow the service, and any Kiddush that is offered. The next session will be November 7<sup>th</sup> at 6:30, followed at 7:30 by the Shabbat evening service at Beth El.

6. Torah Lishmah – a monthly text study session at THOI that looks at something in the way of a Jewish text, drawn variously from Torah, Nevi’im (Prophets), Ketuvim (Writings), Talmud, the Zohar, and other Jewish texts. Open for discussion. This will usually take place

on Friday evening from 6:30 to 7:30, and you are welcome to bring a meal to eat while we talk. On some occasions, it will be moved to Saturday morning, when we have a Shabbat morning service scheduled, and in that case, will follow the service, and any Kiddush that is offered. The next session will be Friday, October 31<sup>st</sup> at 6:30 pm, prior to our Shabbat evening service at THOI. The next session after that will be November 14<sup>th</sup> at the same time, also preceding our Shabbat service.

## **ADULT EDUCATION INITIATIVES**

The Shenandoah Valley Holocaust Education Week planning is starting now. If you would like to be part of making this happen, please speak to Rabbi Joe.

There are many opportunities that are open to us to perform Tikkun Olam (repair of the world) and Gemilut Chasidim (acts of lovingkindness), from supporting First Step and the Blue Ridge Area Food Bank to working at the Volunteer Farm, and much more. The possibilities are limited only by our imagination and energy. There are many other possibilities to volunteer and help our community continue to grow and be vibrant – please consider signing up and taking on one or more of these roles.

It is still not too late to fulfill the mitzvot (commandments) of Tzedakah (righteous action), Gemilut Chasidim (deeds of loving kindness) and Tikkun Olam (repair of the world) by sending a donation to Mazon, and/or by returning the grocery bag with non-perishable foods to the synagogue. We will find a way to deliver the food to the Food bank or First Step so that the increasing number of those in our community who are in desperate need will have food to eat. We received sincere thanks

for sending the food that was in the lobby – it was desperately needed, and the need continues.

Be on the lookout for opportunities for our congregants to engage in some volunteer efforts. Sisterhood will be coordinating a date to work at the Volunteer Farm for their members and others from Beth El. Harvesters, field clearers, and office workers are all needed. The crops produced there go to the food bank for distribution.

### *Invitation to a Talk*

We are invited to a public talk by Pastor Jon Lovelady on Saturday evening, November 1<sup>st</sup>, at the Westminster Presbyterian Church, in Waynesboro. The topic of the talk will be the role of the Presbyterian Church in Germany during WWII, and it is intentionally scheduled to fall just a few days before Krystallnacht as part of an acknowledgement of that event. There are some moves afoot to also have one of the Righteous Among the Nations (a rescuer of Jews) speak at that event, if they are able, so I cannot assure you that this will definitely occur. In any case, this is also in line with the Shenandoah Valley Holocaust Education Week project, which will (tentatively) be scheduled in March of 2009 (details to be forthcoming).
